Class can simply be the backdrop of the story, though; place, rural or urban, simply the setting. The story can focus on any conflict. The editors will curate the stories to contrast the urban and rural settings. Your story need not include both.

Her fiction has appeared in Puerto del Sol, The Texas Review, Oxford Magazine, and other literary journals and anthologies. She has published poetry and nonfiction as well. Arkansas native Michael Gills is the author of eleven books of fiction and nonfiction, including the novel New Harmony (Raw Dog Screaming Press), Book 4 of the Go Love Quartet. A fourth collection of short fiction, Burning Down My Father's House, will be published by Texas Review Press in 2023. Other work has been nominated for the PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction and won the Southern Humanities Review's Theodore Hoefner Prize for Fiction, Southern Review's Best Debut of the Year, recognition in the Best American Short Stories and Pushcart Prize Anthology, and inclusion in New Stories from The South: The Year's Best. His undergraduate novel writing workshop has been featured in USA Today, and several of his students have gone on to publish books of their own, including Emi Wright's, Alegría (Madville Publishing, 2021). Gills is a Distinguished Honors Professor at the University of Utah.



Ana Castillo is a distinguished poet, novelist, short story writer, essayist, editor, playwright, translator, and independent scholar. She is the author of over twenty titles and editor of more than half dozen anthologies. Her art and drawings also appear in various publications. Castillo's book-length prose includes So Far From God, Black Dove: Mamá, Mi'jo, and Me and Peel My Love like an Onion. Her poetry includes: My Book of the Dead, I Ask the Impossible and My Father Was a Toltec. Her novel, Sapogonia was a New York Times Notable Book of the Year.
